# Existing supply chain controls



- In accordance with the UN Global Compact guiding principles we uphold the abolition of child labour across the company and with our contractors
- All contractors must comply with all relevant jurisdictional laws
- Template procurement contracts – general clause requires compliance with all of the company’s policies and standards
- Commercial teams conduct risk assessment of external suppliers
- Mechanisms in place to respond to concerns about unacceptable conduct (e.g. whistleblower hotline)

# Australian Modern Slavery Act and our response



- An Act to require some entities to report annually on the risks of modern slavery in their operations and supply chains and actions to address those risks. Comes into force from 1 January 2019, first corporate statement June 2020
- Assessing our supply chain governance to address potential human rights and corruption risks
- Established an executive leadership steering committee and an operational working group
- Broader assessment of Corporate Governance Framework – policies and management systems.

# Anti-bribery and anti-corruption



- Members of World Gold Council and United Nations Global Compact – aligns with responsible mining policies (e.g. human rights)
- Members of Transparency International and report all our payments to governments. Report against EITI in the Philippines (EITI Candidate Country) and Extractive Sector Reporting in Canada
- Zero-tolerance for bribery and corruption and require the external contractor to comply with our anti-bribery and anti-corruption policy and standard, and the applicable jurisdictional anti-bribery and corruption laws and regulations

# Key responsible mining initiatives



- Established a Responsible Mining Committee – align corporate functional efforts
- Launching a revised responsible mining framework across company – assessed and updated corporate governance and responsible mining policies
- Launching statements of position around: Biodiversity, closure, water, cyanide, energy and greenhouse gas and climate change, and tailings management
- Established External Affairs and Social Performance Management System – systems-based approach to better-understand social and political risks and opportunities
- Enhancing performance and reducing impacts through automation, digital and process transformation
